Geneva provides numerous places to turn to in case of questions, problems, doubts, information needs.


However, it is not always easy to know which door to knock on!

You can meet there professionals who can help you, accompany you or simply answer your questions.













LEXICON

Medical secrecy (or professional secrecy) – Its purpose is to protect the patient and its interests. It guarantees the confidentiality of information. The information concerning the patient cannot be revealed to other persons or institutions without his authorization.

Screening – Examinations carried out to detect the presence or absence of a health problem.

— Sexually Transmitted Infections. Infections that are transmitted from one person to another during sexual relations. The main STIs are HIV and chlamydia, gonorrhea, syphilis, papillomavirus (HPV) and hepatitis. You can get an STI but feel nothing and see nothing.

Currently a very effective treatment (antiretrovirals) allows to fight against the virus. The virus will not be eliminated but it will be controlled and cannot be transmitted. Without treatment, it is transmitted through unprotected sex; needle sharing; and from mother to child during pregnancy and breastfeeding. This virus decreases the body's ability to fight infection.

AIDS – AIDS is an advanced stage of HIV infection. It occurs a few years after infection only if the person does not take treatment. Serious illnesses, called opportunistic diseases (because they take advantage of a weak immune system) will develop.

Seropositivity – Being an HIV-positive person means that the AIDS virus has entered the body. An HIV-positive person does not feel anything in their body, they are not sick.

NOTE: Early and well-monitored HIV treatment can prevent transmission of the virus to others and the onset of serious illness. Thanks to this treatment, HIV-positive people can live as an HIV-negative person: work, have children, play sports and live a long life.

IUD-Pill – These are contraceptive methods. They help to avoid an unwanted pregnancy.

They do not prevent the transmission of STIs.

There are still other means, such as the patch, the ring, the symptothermal method, condoms, etc. All of these contraceptives can be stopped at any time and a pregnancy can occur as soon as contraception is stopped. The calculus method (calculating a non-fertile period according to menstrual periods) and the withdrawal method (withdrawing before ejaculation) are unreliable methods that do not allow to avoid pregnancy and STIs.

BASIC RULES FOR PROTECTION AGAINST SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED INFECTIONS:

- 1. Use a condom for vaginal or anal penetration.
- 2. Use a condom for oral sex and a condom for cunnilingus and annulingus.
- 3. Avoid menstrual blood and sperm in the mouth.
- 4. Consult a doctor in case of itching, burning, discharge, pimples or other problems on the sex, anus or in the mouth.
- 5. Perform regular STI screening.
